Staff Report focusing on Nov. & Dec. 2024 Presented January 2025

Finance and Administration

- *DCR 2025*. Executive Director Kohl and Deputy Director Davis presented the DCR2025 strategies and targets at a joint Board gathering in mid-January. Next steps include refining the targets, creating implementation teams, and launch, plus board and community communication throughout.
- *Insurance Renewal*. The team evaluated broker services (for general liability and related insurances), and switched from Brown and Brown to Crest, the previous provider. The renewal process is almost complete.
- Sustainability Committee. The Sustainability Committee met in November and January. Meeting topics included water conservation and strategic planning (alignment with DCR2025 Strategic Initiative 6: Environmental Sustainability).
- Anniversaries. Congratulations to team members that celebrated anniversaries in November: Dee Nortman – 6 years
- *Personnel*. Welcome ReanaRose Gonzalez, new Community Center Custodian. ReanaRose joined the team in December.

Events, Programs and Recreation

- *Grand Reopening Celebration*. Over 400 residents gathered on the front steps of the newly renovated Desert Camp Community Center for a "sunrise" Grand Reopening ceremony and ribbon cutting. Once the doors were open, residents explored the space including the new fitness studio, and lobby, participated in the community art project, historic photos, cowboy crafts, pickleball and tennis along with the DC Ranch Mercantile. In addition to the celebration, there were multiple pop-up events and enhanced programs throughout the month to welcome and engage residents at Desert Camp.
- *Speaker Series.* In November, Dr. Lynne Kitei captivated an audience with her presentation on The Phoenix Lights, one of Arizona's most compelling UFO phenomena.
- *Candlelit Classics*. The Homestead was aglow in November with over 250 LED candles as a flute and guitar duo graced the stage.
- *Phoenix Art Museum Fashion Tour.* Residents boarded a bus on a journey for a private tour exploring the evolution of fashion.
- Home for the Holidays programming:
 - o *Cookies with Mrs. Claus.* A holiday tradition continued this season as Mrs. Claus joined Ranch families to decorate cookies.

- o *Merry & Bright Trail of Lights.* The new Desert Camp ¼ mile loop was adorned with a dazzling holiday spectacle. An estimated 500 residents enjoyed the lights throughout the month. Neighbors requested that the lights continue annually.
- Cocoa & Caroling. Approximately 150 residents walked the path while they enjoyed fresh desserts and a hot cocoa bar, a musical group singing holiday carols, roaming elves, and a picture with Santa.
- Holiday Cocktails. Residents joined a local chef/mixologist to whip up some delicious holiday inspired drinks.
- Yappy Hour. Residents and their furry friends attended a December Yappy Hour in the glow of the Merry and Bright Trail of Lights.
- *Community Walk*. In November and December residents went on community walks on the Path & Trail System in the Country Club and Reata Wash learning how to navigate using the kiosks and markers.
- Resident-Led Clubs
 - o *Grapenuts Wine.* Residents enjoyed a day trip to the annual Walkin' on Main in Cottonwood.
 - o *Women's Club.* In November, ladies met at Cosanti Originals to enjoy a live viewing of the bronze-pouring and in December, they participated in a gift exchange.
 - Card & Games. Mahjong, Hand and Foot Canasta and Bridge continue to welcome new players during the winter season. All card clubs will relocate to Desert Camp in 2025.
 - Hiking. Resident hikers gather bi-weekly, with an average of 10 participants per hike. Club Leads are responsible for selecting the trailhead, guiding the hike, and maintaining communication with the group.
 - Mountain Biking. In November and December Mountain Biking Club averaged 4
 riders per trail. The riders enjoy different trails throughout Scottsdale and average
 15-miles each adventure.
 - Pickleball. Pickleball averaged 40 players per week during peak season on Sunday mornings. In January, club players will begin meeting on Fridays and Sundays and participation is expected to grow.
 - Off the Ranch: Holiday Dinner. Residents enjoyed a festive meal at Morton's Steakhouse in December.
- *Fitness Classes*. November was the last month for fitness classes at The Homestead. Classes transitioned to the Desert Camp fitness studio in December and were sold out with 81 residents registered. Drop-ins are on pause and will be reevaluated.

Community Engagement

- *DC Ranch Gives.* Resident volunteered at HALO Animal Rescue in November. The Holiday Toy Drive in December collected almost 300 toys for Ronald McDonald House Charities.
- New Resident Welcome. In December, two "Howdies & Handshakes" events were held for new residents including a tour of the community center. Neighborhood Voting Members and community volunteers continue to greet new residents each month with welcome bags.
- "Round the Ranch Sunset Tour. The Sunset Tour in November started at Vito's Italian Ristorante before traveling around the community, showcasing all four Villages to new residents. One resident shared, "I was absolutely blown away by every aspect of it. I feel so

- lucky to have had that experience. I learned so much about DC Ranch and met some wonderful people."
- DC Ranch Mercantile.: Launched on Dec. 7, the online store kicked off at the Desert Camp Grand Reopening event. The store has been popular with more than 20 transactions, many from newer residents. The store's deadline has been extended. The collection featuring the DC Ranch logo includes apparel, kitchenware, and accessories. Most popular items purchased are apparel.
- *Volunteer of the Year.* Consider nominating a resident or community partner in the following categories: Leadership, Good Neighbor, Philanthropy, Youth, and Community Partner. Nominations are due Friday, March 7 on dcranch.com.

Communications

- 2025 Budgets Communication. The 2025 budget letters for the Community Council and Ranch Association were disseminated to residents via email. For those households without a registered email, the letter was sent via email.
- *DC Ranch Email Database.* The Communications Team completed phase one of the project to update the database used to send emails to residents.
- DCSIP Communication. Prior to the grand reopening of Desert Camp, the Communications
 Team continued to communicate with residents with regular frequency regarding the
 conclusion of the project. Specific emails were sent about access, center hours, tennis and
 pickleball courts, and the grand reopening celebration. The team also designed a special
 publication that will be used to educate new and prospective residents about the renovated
 community center and the amenities offered.
- Neighborhood Voting Member Election. The Communications Team supported the Ranch Association by informing residents via print and digital publications about voting in the Neighborhood Voting Member election. The results were posted on DCRanch.com and sent via email to residents.
- *Community Council Board of Directors Applications*. The application was posted in December, and the team continues to promote it to residents in various publications.

Facilities

- Community Center. Since the opening on Dec. 7, Desert Camp's lobby has had approximately 1,780 lobby check-ins during staffed hours in December. The Fitness Center had 1,818 unique check-ins. Many resident and staff interactions involved positive feedback and appreciation for the renovated center, and many first-time users have been using the facility. Pickleball Courts have had a combined 500+ reservations booked since the Grand Reopening date. The Homestead Community Center saw a drop in usage, with 173 check-ins for November, and 120 lobby-checks for December.
- Facility Rentals. The Homestead remains open for rentals and has had a fair amount of activity in the past two months. Any inquiries about renting Desert Camp are instead referred to The Homestead, as Desert Camp resident rentals will open in spring. This allows time for punch list items to be completed.
- Facility Maintenance and Custodial construction team to wrap up punch list items and provide final changes in the spaces with additional reserve and operational projects

including roundabout directional paint, AV closet clean out projects at Desert Camp, AV clean out at The Homestead, The Homestead front door replacement, and storage solution projects.

Public Affairs

- City Elections. Chris Irish, Director of Public Affairs, reached out to all four of the newly elected city officials. To date, she has met with Jan Dubauskas three times and Adam Kwasman once. Chris knows Mary Ann McAllen well and is scheduled to meet with her next week. Mayor Borowsky has been harder to schedule. Chris attended the Inauguration and first City Council meeting. DC Ranch will host city council and other community leaders for an open house at Desert Camp in February.
- Traffic on 94th and 91st Streets. Chris had a second meeting with city traffic engineers; Mike Wells, Ranch Association Director of Operations, sat in. Chris also invited several NVM's but none attended. Chris hopes to meet with the NVM's in February to share information on the roundabout, specifically to see if the neighborhood is in favor of pushing to have it.
- *Thompson Peak Bridge Expansion.* This project has been a talking point when Chris meets with city council members. Design is supposed to be in city's FY24/25 but to date is not.
- *New subdivision at 94th and Bell.* Chris heard from several residents that construction was starting around 6am. Chris reached out to the developer to ensure they knew the city's start time is currently 7am. They corrected the contractor, and our residents were pleased.
- *CFD.* Chris and board Vice President Elizabeth Kepuraitis are scheduled to meet with the city auditor on Feb. 3. They will review the backup data for the \$330,000+ invoice DC Ranch submitted in February 2024. The finance team and Mike Wells have provided the data. With four new city council members, we will have to educate them on this project.
