Desert Camp parking lot closure

The Desert Camp Community Center parking lot will be closed for seal coating and re-striping on April 17. The facility and outdoor amenities will be accessible via the path and trail only. Please note that parking is not permitted along the street or in nearby neighborhoods. The north parking lot is expected to reopen by 7 a.m. on April 18, with the remainder of the lot reopening later that morning.

Path and trail etiquette

The community's path and trail system is a favorite among residents. Please remember to keep to the right, pass on the left, and announce your presence with a bell or voice command. For safety reasons, motorized vehicles such as golf carts, ATVs and skateboards are not permitted on sidewalks or the paths and trails. Bicyclists should slow down when nearing pedestrians and maintain safe speeds. Only battery-operated toy vehicles for children 7 or younger may be driven on the path system or sidewalks under the supervision of an adult.

Pets off leash and pick-up reminder

It is a City of Scottsdale statute and a DC Ranch standard that all pets should be kept under the control of their owner at all times. Also, in order to keep the community looking beautiful, it is important to pick up after your pet. Waste stations are located throughout neighborhood parks.

Weed maintenance

The Landscape team is currently underway with the weed maintenance program which should be complete by end of May. The most common invasive weed is Globe chamomile (pictured). Residents should remove this plant from their yards before it dries and turns to seed.



Irrigation checkup reminder

Irrigation systems should be tested regularly to ensure efficiency and water conservation. Signs you may have damage or a leak include water runoff into the street, uncommon wet areas in your landscape, low water pressure and bubbling water.
